



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### **KEYNOTE PRESENTERS**



Major Jackson | Poet, Professor + Editor at "The Harvard Review"

Major is a professor at the University of Vermont and author of four books of poetry: *Roll Deep, Holding Company, Hoops* and *Leaving Saturn*, which won the Cave Canem Poetry Prize. He is editor of Library of America's *Countee Cullen: Collected Poems*.
